**Re: HB 233 (Born-Alive Protections)**

Dear Mr. Chair and Members of the Committee:

As the Director of the Office of Public Policy of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Manchester, and on behalf of Bishop Peter Libasci, I write **in support of HB 233**, the Born Alive Protection Act.

This bill seeks to have New Hampshire join a number of other states that have put laws into place to protect babies who survive abortions. The Kermit Gosnell case is just one notorious example of babies surviving abortions but being killed or left to die after they are born.

The views of the Catholic Church on issues relating to life ultimately are drawn, of course, from the perspective of faith. But the Church's views are based on reason as well. There are some things which our common human nature tells us are the right things to do in a particular situation, and these are really beyond the realm of debate, because it is basic human nature which impels us in that direction.


For that reason, it presumably is not controversial to assert that a newborn baby should receive (as this bill says) "medically appropriate and reasonable care and treatment." I suspect that no one would disagree with that statement standing alone.

So does the fact that the child is a survivor of an abortion change anything? A health care provider who happened upon a baby in distress would do all in his or her power to care for that child without regard to the circumstances of that child's birth. How that child came to be born would be an utterly irrelevant consideration. That this newborn baby is a survivor of abortion likewise is irrelevant. The pregnancy is over. The living child, now outside of the mother's womb, cannot be said to be anything other than a legally-recognized person entitled to the full protection of the law.

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Therefore, I respectfully urge the Committee to vote ought to pass on HB 233.
